

Let us see what happens next to Shumba.


As Shumba shivered, people threw things at him and took photos.



One day, Emma came to see him. She had a plan to rescue the animals. 'You're going home,' she told Shumba.








Shumba was the last to leave the plane. 'What if my family has forgotten about me?' he asked Emma, but she told him that mothers, like elephants, never forget.

Then Shumba's dad came home and was very happy to see his boy. Shumba had never had so many cuddles and licks in his life.







He told his family about the ship, the kind dolphin, the monkeys, and the zoo where he was cold and lonely. He told them about Emma who had set him free.
